1.4 Whether there is any revision/update of regulation of syllabi, if yes, mention their salient aspects.

In accordance with the affiliation rules of the Bangalore University, we retain the basic model for all the courses that we offer. Periodic and regular (mandatorily every three years), syllabi of all departments is upgraded. The BOS of each department meets to upgrade, revise, include and drop topics. Salient changes made by each department are as follows.

- 1. The Department of Psychology, in the BOS held in March 2018, revised the I Year B.A. syllabus. The basic concepts and tenets remain; dimensions and dynamics relevant to life today were incorporated. Research styles, perceptual processes, latest techniques to study and assess behavior, and applications of learning principles are included. Also, for projects and internal assessment, students from all three semesters are given questionnaires and inventories to collect data, and learn to analyse and draw inferences.
- 2. The Department of Commerce revised the syllabi of B.Com course keeping in mind the following points.
  - i. The needs of first generation learners.
  - ii. The vision to enrich and empower women learners
  - iii. The need for nurturing sensitive and socially responsible women for a sustainable future.

All the changes were made based on group discussions among faculty and inputs from external subject experts, alumni feedback etc.,

The topics like The GST Act 2017, Developments in Banking, Impact of Companies Act 2013 were incorporated in the syllabus. Modifications were also made to improve Mathematical skills to build competitive edge.

- 3. Department of Botany: The entire I sem syllabus was spilt into 05 chapters and the title of Topic was changed from" Diversity of Vascular plants "to "Biodiversity of Microbes and Phycology"
- 4. Department of Biotechnology: Student research projects were introduced for final year students. The projects were presented and assessed by external examiners.
- 5. Department of Zoology: To enhance the skill based training, Hands on training in practical aspects of the subject was introduced.
- 6. Department of Chemistry (UG): Syllabus revised upto 15%, Retrosynthetic chemistry, Green chemistry, Fuel cells, Food and Nutrition etc. introduced.
- 7. Department of English: Syllabus for General English for all semesters revised and a new textbook 'Perspectives' prescribed and published. Changes made in first year Optional English syllabus. A literary component introduced in semesters I IV of BBA.

#### 5.13 Major grievances of students (if any) redressed:

Mentors and Class Teachers receive both oral and written complaints of grievances from students. After the initial verification processes the matter is brought to the attention of the principal. 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- In the formation of the BOS, the management encouraged the Heads of Departments in appointing experts from other colleges and universities.
   Necessary emoluments were released instantly, including their travel expenses.
- The Department of Sociology replaced elective Demography by Sociology of Education with a view to help students to pursue B.Ed., Courses. The curriculum was also modified to benefit Non-Sociology students coming from other streams such as Science/ Commerce / Management. Curriculum also includes empowering women in areas of rural development.
- The Departments of Computer Science, Chemistry and Biotechnology introduced In-house Student Projects and made Industrial visits as a part of curriculum.
- The Departments of Journalism and Management updated their syllabus in consultation with industry experts to meet the industry needs.
- English Department revised the General English Text book for all semesters with focus on contemporary literary trends. Workshops were conducted for the revised syllabus.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Variety of student centric methodologies for teaching and learning are
  used in the class rooms. Activities, group discussions, paper presentations,
  survey and collection of data for projects actively engage students to
  manage knowledge development and skill formation. As a result the
  college has witnessed a favourable and guaranteed process of students
  moving to the status of an autonomous learner.
- The Department of English introduced the concept of **Page to Stage** where theatre activity was used as an extension of classroom teaching. A part of General English text "Suryaputra" which showcases Karna's life was chosen for the play during the year 2017-18. The play was evolved with a view that it generates a discussion on the status anxiety that Karna suffers from. The play involved the viewpoints of the great writers in Kannada to portray the heart rending story of Karna from his birth to his tragic death.
- The concept of **Page to Stage** is not only an indispensable tool for imparting skills like empathy, active listening, trust and co-operation in team activities, but also helps in moulding the students' personalities by bringing a deep ethical dimension to their lives.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

One Time Fast Track examination was conducted in July 2017 for students who could not meet the Eligibility conditions, to give them one more attempt in order to become eligible. Following this, the eligibility conditions were defined as follows.

I Semester to II Semester: No criteria

II Semester to III Semester: Student should have passed 50% of total number of

subjects of I & II semesters together III Semester to IV Semester: No criteria

V Semester to VI Semester: Student should have passed 75% of total number of subjects of I & II semesters together and 75% of total number of subjects of III & IV semesters together.

A Mid-Semester and an End Semester Examination for each semester is conducted. While the mid-semester performance offers a fair idea of the students' preparedness to take examinations and evaluate their knowledge level, the end semester qualifies a student to progress to the next stage.

A system of Central evaluation is followed by review of papers by External Examiners. Grievances regarding valuation, marks and errors are brought to the notice of the COE and the Principal and they are redressed with utmost speed and care. Infrastructural facilities were enhanced this academic year by adding copiers and computers.

As ours is a women's college, an additional attempt was given to students who had cleared the papers within the stipulated attempt.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

- The Research Advisory Committee interacts with the faculty members and encourages them to apply for research grants and present papers in National and International Conferences. The space and necessary infrastructural support for research work is provided by the institution.
- College has been identified for support in level O category by DST under FIST Programme -2016. The college has received Rs.92 lakhs as first instalment to strengthen the teaching and research facilities in all science departments.
- The Management also supports the research activities by funding Minor Research Programmes from faculty and students. The Department of Biotechnology received Rs.36000/- for a minor project on "Phyco-Remediation of Lake Waters in Bangalore"
- The PG Department of Commerce has applied to Bangalore University for a Research Centre. The Research Centre status of Department of Chemistry has been renewed by Bangalore University.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

#### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- The Human Resource of the college is managed in a free and democratic manner.

They have also introduced an Internship for 8 weeks during the fourth semester of PG Journalism and Mass Communication. 7 students are doing the mandatory internship program out of which 6 students have been absorbed in the same organization during their internship term.
  - The Management students have compulsory internship program from 4<sup>th</sup> Semester onwards.
  - The Department of Sociology organizes visits to villages, orphanages and old age homes as Out-reach programs. This gives practical exposures through fields study.
  - In the Department of Commerce, motivation is built by identifying core competencies in younger staff members and giving them functional freedom to build efficient student teams who will represent college at reputed competitions. The staff are encouraged to attend FDPs to build up their current knowledge quotient.
